

## ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION

In the event that a student is expelled from school for a long term period (longer than 10 days), he/she may take correspondence classes. Creighton Community School must approve the classes in advance or credit will not be allowed. The school will recognize the high school correspondence classes from the UNL High School Correspondence class catalog. Through these classes, the student will be able to continue his/her academic work for credit even though he/she is expelled and unable to attend classes in the Creighton School. A teacher at the school shall proctor the test for the classes. The parents are to pay the initial cost of the classes. If the student receives a passing grade at the completion of the coursework, the parents must provide a valid receipt and transcript to the school in order to be reimbursed for the coursework and to receive academic credit. It should be noted that this plan is available to the student. The final decision is up to the parents as to whether to pursue the correspondence classes.

Students in K-8 will make up their class time outside of the regular school day. They will pick up their school work and return it to the teacher before or after school. Teachers will proctor the tests for the K-8 students.

If a student fails to meet any of the conditions of the learning program, the school district may, without further obligation, terminate the program after a due process hearing as defined in the statutory provisions for suspension and expulsion of students, unless waived by the parents or guardians.

If the parent or guardian should refuse to participate, the school district has no further obligation with regard to the provision of an alternative school, class, or program.
